GUARDIANS

Many of our elderly guardians struggle to find any kind of work due to their age. It is a blessing that we are able to offer some piecework at times under the supervision of our groundsman, John.

REAPING A HARVEST

Investment in people is never wasted and this is very evident with our groundsman John. He has been working with us since we moved to our new site in 2014. Over the years he has not only sought and listened to advice but also put into action what he has learned. During 2016, we offered our guardians training in '*Foundations for Farming*', a method of cultivating the land based on biblical principles. John was eager to be included in this and worked closely with the trainer to learn as much as he could. In 2017 John was the one training our guardians while tending to the Arise farming plot as the training ground. John has taught our guardians well and our crops have surpassed many others.

When the trainers for '*Foundations for Farming*' came to visit earlier this year they were very impressed with the way John had implemented what he'd learned and managed to train others. They asked if we could release John for day to go and talk with others they were training about how he managed to apply these skills. John has been greatly encouraged and enthused in his work as a result of this opportunity.

SCHOOL

We are very proud of the many students who returned to school this year as we know not everyone does. A recent report came out in Zambia stating that government research showed not all teachers in Zambia were able to read and write. Although on one level this is shocking news, it makes it easier to see why so many of our pupils struggling at school.

Kapumpe Christian Primary School is a local community school set up and run by Arise. Currently it caters for pre-school to grade 6.

We will continue to do all we can to support other local schools with Grades 1-9. It is wonderful to hear that the local government school has added a secondary classes and although the standards are yet to be seen, it means that many local children will have the opportunity to complete their schooling which ends at Grade 12.

COLLEGE

Our older students are enrolled in a wide range of programmes across different towns. It is not always easy to communicate with them during the year so we rely heavily on them coming to visit the office when they are available.

At the end of April we had a visit from Matthews, who has been studying Electrical Engineering, to say he has completed his course and passed. What a great example he is to the rest of his family!

Another student, Cacious, has visited to tell us he was nominated to be president of the association, for all those in Zambia studying his course – Programmes and Operations Management. These pupils are spread over three institutions but Cacious is taking the position seriously and including everyone.

We are so happy to see our guardians keen to develop their own business to support their families. There were some challenges our first group faced and we are trying to learn from these before we begin our second group.

This term we have had approximately 40 pupils each week. They have come eager to hear God's word and learn new verses from the Bible. We have been teaching about the patriarchs this term as well as The Easter Story. Many of our children think they know what the bible says but find it hard to apply it to their lives. Some have also been taught messages about Christianity which are not true. It has been wonderful to share with them this term why God sent His Son, Jesus to die for their sins – because He loves them! We know that many of our youth go home and share what they've learned with friends and family.
